National Current Operations & Monitoring



Significant Incidents or Threats:

- Tornadoes Response/Recovery Tennessee
- Severe Thunderstorms/Flash Flooding Southern Plains
- Critical Fire Weather/Red Flag Warnings CO, KS, NE, TX, and WY

Tornadoes – Tennessee



<u>Situation:</u> Seven EF-2 and EF-3 tornadoes touched down early Tuesday morning near Nashville, TN. Preliminary damage assessments are ongoing and initial assessments indicate significant damage to Putman, Benton, Davidson, Gibson, Carroll, and Wilson counties.

Lifeline Impacts:

Safety and Security:

- Multiple schools in impacted area remain closed due to storm damage
- 48 buildings have collapsed or partially collapsed
- Search and Rescue ongoing in Putman County; 77 people remain missing

Food, Water, Shelter:


- 5 (+4) shelters open / 104 occupants (ARC shelter count, 7:00 a.m. ET) Health and Medical: (Region IV SPOTREP #3)
- 25 (+18) fatalities confirmed and 65 injuries reported
- Cookeville Hospital has 30 critical patients relocating to Knoxville and Ehrlinger Energy:
- 40k (-32k) customers without power statewide (* EAGLE-I as of 7:00 a.m. ET) Transportation:
- · John C. Tune Municipal Airport remains closed
- · All major interstate highways reopened; debris removal ongoing
- Music City Star train not operating due to storm debris

State/Local Response:

TN EOC at Partial Activation; Governor declared a State of Emergency

Federal Response:


- Region IV:

 - o FEMA Interim Operating Facility (IOF) established
 - o RRCC: Rostered; RWC: Steady State, continues to monitor
- · FEMA NWC continues to monitor


National Weather Forecast






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall





Severe Weather Outlook








