National Current Operations & Monitoring



Significant Incidents or Threats:

- Tornadoes Tennessee Response/Recovery
- Severe Thunderstorms Southeast

Declaration Activity: None

Tornadoes – Tennessee



<u>Situation:</u> A storm system moved through the state of Tennessee bringing tornadic activity, heavy rain, hail, and powerful winds, through the west and middle regions of the state. Seven tornadoes reported as a combination of EF-2, EF-3 and one EF-4, leaving a wide path of destruction through the counties of Davidson, Wilson, Putnam, Gibson, Carroll, and Benton.

Lifeline Impacts:

Safety and Security:

- · Five schools remain closed; relocation plans being established for students
- 1,546 structures damaged/destroyed; damage assessments continue
- SAR missions concluded in Davidson County; all 195 missing are accounted for

Food, Water, Shelter:

• 6 (+1) shelters open / 109 (+5) occupants (ARC shelter count, 5:30 a.m. ET)

Health and Medical:

• 24 (-1) confirmed fatalities; 65 injuries reported

Energy:

- 21k (-19k) customers without power statewide (* EAGLE-I as of 7:30 a.m. ET)
 - 19k outages in Davidson County

Transportation:


- · John C. Tune Municipal Airport remains closed
- Music City Star transit service (local rail service) remains closed due to debris; minimal impact as alternate transit services available and all major roadways open

State/Local Response:

• TN EOC at Partial Activation; Governor declared a State of Emergency

Federal Response:


- Region IV:
 - IMAT-2 Deployed to TN EOC
 - o Pre-declaration FEMA Initial Operating Facility (IOF) established at TN EOC
 - o RRCC: rostered; RWC continues to monitor
- · FEMA NWC continues to monitor


National Weather Forecast






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall






Severe Weather Outlook





Hazards Outlook – Mar 7-11









