## **Ornament Instructions**

Ornaments must be made of non-breakable material and strong enough to hold up during shipping and to be handled while the tree is being decorated. For these reasons, we recommend students do not use fragile items or paper cutouts that may tear easily. Please attach a ten-inch loop of ribbon or string from which each ornament will hang.
