Situation:

- The fire began on June 13, and is burning on state and private land in and around Red Lodge and Belfry (combined population 2,500)
- Threatening 450 homes, 312 buildings, infrastructure, utilities and equipment
- Over 10,000 acres burned; 0% contained
- Voluntary evacuations in effect for 900 people

Response:


- MT EOC at Monitoring (COVID-19)

- FMAG was approved on June 16, 2021






Tropical Outlook – Five Day

Eastern Pacific




Disturbance 1 (as of 2:00 a.m. ET)

- A few hundred miles S of the coast of southern Mexico
- Moving slowly NW, parallel to the southwestern coast of Mexico
- Conditions should be favorable for gradual development later this week, and a tropical depression could form over the weekend
- 48-hour formation chance: Low (10%)
- 5-day formation chance: Medium (60%)

Tropical Depression Carlos (Advisory #15 as of 5:00 a.m. ET)

- 1,910 miles WSW of the southern tip of Baja California
- Moving W at 7 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 35 mph
- Expected to degenerate to a remnant low later today and dissipate in a few days

Atlantic




Disturbance 1 (as of 2:00 a.m. ET)

- Located over the Bay of Campeche
- Tropical depression likely to form by late Thursday or on Friday when it moves across the western Gulf of Mexico
- Heavy rains could begin to impact portions of the northern Gulf Coast on Friday
- 48-hour formation chance: Medium (60%)
- 5-day formation chance: High (90%)








