
Eastern Pacific



Tropical Storm Dolores (Advisory #5A as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- 80 miles W of Lazaro Cardenas, Mexico
- Moving NNW at 13 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 65 mph
- Forecast to be near hurricane strength when it makes landfall later today
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward 105 miles

Atlantic



Tropical Storm Claudette (Advisory #7A as of 8:00 a.m. ET)

- 30 miles N of New Orleans, LA
- 120 miles W of Mobile, AL
- Moving NNE at 12 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 45 mph
- Claudette is expected to weaken to a tropical depression by tonight and become a post-tropical cyclone on Sunday
- Forecast to re-develop over the western Atlantic
 Ocean on Monday
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward 205 miles



Tropical Storm Claudette - Preparations

<u>Situation:</u> As of 8:00 a.m. ET, the storm was located 30 miles north of New Orleans, LA. Claudette is forecast to move further inland during the next several hours, then move across the Gulf coast and southeastern states through the weekend. Heavy rainfall and life threating flash flooding is expected across the Gulf Coast into the Florida panhandle through this afternoon.

Warnings/Watches

- Tropical Storm Warnings in effect east of Morgan City, LA to the Okaloosa/Walton County, FL Rainfall
- Rainfall totals of 5-10 inches with isolated amounts up to 15 inches, expected across portions
 of the central Gulf Coast and up to 6 inches isolated amounts up to 8 inches, expected
 across central Alabama and into the Carolinas
 - Considerable flash, urban and small stream flooding impacts as well as new and renewed minor to isolated moderate river flooding likely

Storm Surge

Storm Surge up to 1-3 ft possible from Morgan City, LA to Panama City, FL


Region IV:

- MS & FL EOCs at Partial Activation (COVID-19)
- AL EOC at Normal Operations; No significant posture changes anticipated

Region VI:

- LA: EOC at Monitoring (Tropical Weather); Crisis Action Team activated and SAR resources on standby
 - Governor declared State of Emergency; 5 parishes issued Emergency Declarations
 - State is positioning pumps, conducting sandbagging operation, and closing flood gates
- No reported shortfalls or requests for FEMA assistance





FEMA Preparations:

- FEMA Region IV RRCC rostered; RWC is Monitoring
 - IMAT-'s 1 & 2 available; FIT members in contact with state counterparts
- FEMA Region VI RRCC at Level III (COVID-19); RWC is Monitoring
 - IMAT-'s 1 & 2 available; Field Leader Cadre LNO in Baton Rouge, LA
- FEMA HQ
 - NRCC at Level III (COVID); rostered for full activation
 - NWC is monitoring; Enhanced Watch rostered
 - Coordinating with CISA on infrastructure in the potentially impacted areas
 - National IMAT and US&R teams identified for immediate deployment
 - MERS: communications resources available from Denton, TX and Thomasville, GA
 - Logistics: 4 ISB teams on alert; distribution centers stocked/on-call for response
 - FCOs pre-identified for potentially impacted states



Flood Hazard Messages

associated with Tropical Storm Claudette


- Across coastal Mississippi and Alabama, and the far western Florida Panhandle, heavy rainfall, associated with Tropical Storm Claudette, may cause life-threatening flash flooding impacts through Saturday.
- Elsewhere across the Central Gulf Coast, and into central Alabama and west central Georgia, considerable flash, urban and small stream flooding impacts are likely. New and renewed river rises to minor and isolated moderate flood will persist well into next week.
- Rainfall will expand across portions of the Southeast through the weekend.
 Limited impacts from flash, urban, small stream and isolated minor river flooding are possible.
- Additional rainfall early next week across this same region may exacerbate flooding.





Severe Weather Outlook







Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall





Fire Weather Outlook




