Flooding Impacts – Tennessee













Situation: Heavy rain caused catastrophic flooding and flash flooding across Tennessee beginning August 21 and continuing. The most impacted areas are in Middle Tennessee in the counties of Dickson, Hickman, Houston, and Humphreys; the city of Waverly (pop 4k) is the most impacted.

Impacts: (Region IV Advisory Message, Update 6, Aug 25, 5:03 a.m. ET)

Safety & Security

- Search and Rescue missions continue in Dickson, Humphreys, and Hickman Counties; 3 missing people
- Reunification Center at McEwen High School in Humphreys County closed yesterday
- Damage assessments ongoing in Hickman and Houston counties

Food, Water & Shelter

- 3 (-1) Red Cross shelters open with 82 (-11) occupants (ARC Midnight Shelter Count, 7:02 a.m. ET)
- 2 water treatment plants damaged in Humphrey County
- Boil Water Notice for Waverly remains in effect; waterline break repairs continue
- Walmart supporting local recovery efforts, coordinating with community leaders, providing awareness to potential supply chain disruptions

Health & Medical

- Three Rivers Hospital water is restored city providing
- Waverly requested medics and providers for hospital; staff cannot get to hospital
- Fatalities: 17 confirmed in Humphreys County; media reports 18 (-3) unconfirmed fatalities
- Tennessee Dept. of Health is making tetanus shots available

Energy


Power returned to normal; 500 remain without power long-term due to conditions of their homes

 AT&T services in Waverly restored; Houston County 911 center taking calls over normal circuits **Transportation**

3 bridges washed away in Dickson County; CSX railroad has been restored between Dickson and Waverly


- TN EOC at Partial Activation (COVID)


- Region IV RWC continues to monitor; RRCC is rostered



- Tropical depression is likely to form this weekend
- Formation chance: 48 hours: Low (30%); 5 days: High (80%)




- Several hundred miles SW of the Cabo Verde Islands
- Formation chance 48 hours: Low (20%); 5 days: Low (30%)













Severe Weather Outlook





Hazards Outlook - Aug 27-31






