Flooding Impacts – Tennessee - FINAL ()













Situation: Heavy rain caused catastrophic flooding and flash flooding across Tennessee that occurred August 21-23. The most impacted areas are in Middle Tennessee in the counties of Dickson, Hickman, Houston, and Humphreys; the city of Waverly (pop 4k) is the most impacted. Multi-Agency Recovery Centers (MARC) established and supporting long-term housing.

Impacts: (Region IV, Update 8, Aug 25, 7:41 p.m. ET)

Safety & Security

- All missing individuals are accounted for: Search and Rescue operations are now complete
- Humphreys county schools closed for estimated 2 weeks; TN Dept. of Education is providing support
- Damage assessments ongoing in Hickman and Houston counties

Food, Water & Shelter

- 4 Red Cross shelters open with 41 (-309) occupants; ARC Mobile feeding started on Aug 26
- 2 water treatment plants damaged in Humphrey County
- Boil Water Notice for areas of Bon Aqua/Lyles Utility District lifted; system fully operational
- Estimated 90% of Waverly station customers have water as of Aug 25
 - Water being fed into the east end of the city today

Health & Medical

- Waverly requested medics and providers for hospital
- Fatalities: 20 (+1) confirmed in Humphreys County
- TN Dept. of Health administered 300 tetanus shots; pharmaceuticals and Hepatitis A vaccine available
- Both Wastewater Treatment Plants are operational; sewers operational with 1 broken line that is leaking into Trace Creek


Communications

- AT&T services in Waverly restored; Houston County 911 center taking calls over normal circuits
- TEMA Command bus arrived on location in Waverly on Aug 24; deploying a COMMU to assist with planning
- T-MOBILE providing 250 free Cell Phones & one month Cell Service to Humphreys County Flood Victims on Aug 26; AT&T providing 300 cell phones

Transportation

- CSX railroad has been restored between Dickson and Waverly; Freight traffic open from Nashville to Bruceton to Memphis
- SR1/Highway 70 LM 16.3 and I-40 Exit 152 are open







- Army/ANG supporting debris removal and air operations



- 1 MEOV in Waverly and Green Hornet is demobilizing
- FEMA VAL support is available
- Major Disaster Declaration Approved; FEMA-4609-DR-TN
- The Governor, FEMA Administrator, Region IV Administrator, TEMA Director, staff and MG Holmes conducted a flyover of the impacted area


Atlantic Overview TROPICAL OUTLOOK




Tropical Storm Ida SATELLITE LOOP




Tropical Storm Ida FORECAST TRACK

Tropical Storm Ida HURRICANE WIND PROBABILITIES




Tropical Storm Ida STORM SURGE WATCH




Tropical Storm Ida PEAK STORM SURGE FORECAST



Tropical Storm Ida 5 DAY RAINFALL




Tropical Storm Ida FLASH FLOOD RISK





Tropical Storm Ida – Atlantic

<u>Situation:</u> At 8:00 a.m. ET, Tropical Storm Ida was 75 miles north-northwest of Grand Cayman. On the forecast track, the center of Ida will pass over the southeastern and central Gulf of Mexico tonight and Saturday and is forecast to approach the northern Gulf coast on Sunday. Ida is forecast to be at or near major hurricane strength when it approaches the northern Gulf coast.

Potential Impacts:

- Life-threatening storm surge possible for coastal LA, MS, & AL
- Total rainfall accumulations of 8-16 inches with isolated maximum 20 inches, for southeast LA to coastal MS and LA through Monday morning

State/Local Response:

- TX & LA EOCs at Partial Activation for COVID-19 and Tropics
- LA Governor declared State of Emergency and requested an Emergency Declaration
- MS EOC expected to activate on Aug 29; FL at Normal Operations will go enhanced this weekend; AL EOC at Normal Operations, may go enhanced this weekend

Region IV:

- RRCC will activate to Level III with ESFs 1, 3,6, 7, 8, 12, 14, 15, DCE, and USCG, day shift only, tomorrow
- IMAT-1 deploying to MS tomorrow; IMAT-2 deployed to TN (flooding)
- One HLT staff member deployed to NHC
- RA remains in communication with State Directors of high-risk states
- Preparing Mission Assignments to activate Maxwell AFB as an ISB
- Requested 1 HQ Movement Control Unit (MCU) to support logistics in RRCC

Region VI:


- RRCC at Level III; will activate to Level II with ESFs 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14-CISA, DoD, USCG, Civil Air Patrol, NWS, 24/7 on Sunday, Aug 29
- IMAT-1 deploying to IOF in Baton Rouge, LA
- IMAT-2 will hold in place, with possible movement to Austin, TX; TX Recovery Office will be used for IOF
- LNOS deployed to LA and TX


- NRCC at Level III (Dayshift) will activate 24/7 Saturday (Level I Days, III Nights)
- National IMAT RED deploying to LA Integrated Recovery Office (LIRO) in Baton Rouge, LA

- US&R: deploying (1) IST, (2) Type 1 task forces, (5) Type 3 task forces to Barksdale, AFB, Shreveport, LA; additional (1)Type 1 and (2) Type 3 task forces on alert

- SMT Atlanta deploying to ISB in Alexandria, LA
- Camp Beauregard/Esler is additional FSA if needed
- MERS: deploying MEOV and EOV to Baton Rouge, LA; deploying IRV and LMR tower to Barksdale, AFB, LA to support US&R





Tropical Storm Ida – Atlantic



National Weather Forecast










Hazards Outlook - Aug 29 - Sep 2







<u>Situation:</u>, The Caldor Fire continues to grow with little change in containment. Steep and rugged terrain, critically dry fuel conditions, and lack of adequate resources have presented control challenges. Firefighters are continuing with the firing operations to strengthen control lines, but fire conditions remain active.

Impacts:

- Substantial critical utility infrastructure damage and destruction in the Grizzly Flats area
- PG&E distribution/transmission lines, distribution substations, telecom towers, and fiber optic resources threatened
 - o Provides power to thousands of customers in El Dorado/surrounding areas; value of assets estimated to be \$11M
 - Approximately 3k customers currently without power (source: Caldor Fire ICS 209 report, as of Aug 25, 8:45 p.m. ET)
- Grizzly Flats water storage/distribution infrastructure threatened; 1.2k customers potentially impacted
- 5 evacuation centers established; 1 (Cameron Park) full (source: Caldor Fire ICS 209 report, as of Aug 25, 8:45 p.m. ET)
- HWY 50 is closed from Sly Park to Myers; HWY 50 is a major Trans-Sierra HWY vital to emergency evacuation
- USDA Forest Service, Pacific Southwest Region, closed 9 national forests through Sep 6

Response:

- Total personnel assigned: 2,667
- 55% of perimeter inspected; damage inspections in progress
- Incident Command estimates the fire will be contained by Aug 31
- Firefighting air tankers throughout state are flying suppression missions
- Six shelters / 500 occupants (source: Region IX APU Meeting Notes, as of Aug 25)
- Region IX IMAT-2 deployed to Sacramento, CA on Aug 25


