

<u>Tropical Storm Odette</u> (Advisory #3, as of 5:00 a.m. ET)

Invest 95L (Disturbance 1) (as of 2:00 a.m. ET)

- 650 miles ESE of the northern Leeward Islands
- Tropical depression or tropical storm is expected to form later today or tomorrow as it moves WNW at 15 mph
- Formation chance: 48 hours: High (90%); 5 days: High (90%)

Disturbance 2 (as of 2:00 a.m. ET)


- Located a few hundred miles S of the Cabo Verde Islands
- Formation chance: 48 hours: Medium (40%); 5 days:
 Medium (40%)



Tropical Storm Odette

Tropical Storm Odette (Advisory #3 as of 5:00 a.m. ET)

- 225 miles S of Nantucket, MA
- Moving NE at 15 mph
- Maximum sustained winds 45 mph
- On the forecast track, the center of Odette will pass south of Atlantic Canada on Sunday and Monday
- Strengthening is forecast during the next day or two; expected to become a strong post-tropical low by Saturday night
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward up to 195 miles
- Swells generated by Odette are affecting portions of the U.S.
 Mid-Atlantic coast and are expected to spread northward to portions of the Northeast this weekend; these swells are likely to cause life threatening surf and rip current conditions





Invest 95L - FEMA Preparations

<u>Situation:</u> The National Hurricane Center has forecast a high likelihood for the development of a tropical cyclone near the Caribbean which may impact USVI or PR. The system is moving west-northwest at 15 mph across the central tropical Atlantic.


FEMA Region II Preparations:

- RRCC at Level III, day shift, with select ESFs, and DCE
- Deploying to USVI: IMAT A, IMAT B, DEC, LNOS, USVI Light Force Package, ESFs 3, 8, 12, 14, and DCE to be in place by Sep 19
- Deploying to PR: PR Light Force Package, DEC, LNOS, ESFs 2, 3, 8, 12, 14, and DCE to be in place by Sep 19

FEMA HQ:

- NRCC at Level III (COVID); postured to support increased staffing, if required
- FEMA NWC coordinating reporting and awareness with Region II and NHC
- Region V IMAT deploying to DC Caribbean in Puerto Rico to be in place by Sep 19
- National IMAT Blue, National IMAT Gold, and two back-up Regional IMATs available
- SMT and ISB teams deploying to Puerto Rico to be in place by Sep 19
- Mobile Emergency Communications (MERS) are standing by





76th United Nations General Assembly

<u>Situation:</u> The 76th Session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) will be held at UN Headquarters in New York, NY from Sep 14-30, 2021. The first day of the high-level General Debate will be on Tuesday, Sep 21, 2021.

- Sep 19-25 has been designated as an NSSE
- The event is largely virtual; however, 83 world leaders are expected to be physically present, with a total attendance of approximately 2,000


Preparations:

- USSS is lead Law Enforcement and Coordination Agency
- FBI is the lead Intelligence and Counterterrorism Agency
- NYPD is the lead for local law enforcement
- FAA will establish a 7 and 20 nautical mile Temporary Flight Restriction from 8:00 a.m.
 5:00 p.m. ET
- FEMA is lead for consequence management planning and coordination


FEMA Preparations:


- NRCC activated for COVID-19; available to support
- NWC will activate to Enhanced Watch on Sep 19
- National IMAT Blue on alert
- US&R, CMCU, and DEST on alert
- DEC will provide communications and mobile command functions to Region II and other Federal agencies as directed
- Region II RWC will go to Enhanced Watch (day shift only) on Sep 19 for the duration of event
- Providing liaisons to several operations centers






National Weather Forecast









Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall
