

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN STRATEGY OVERVIEW



Trenton's current American Rescue Plan Proposal covers \$71.69 million in direct federal aid.

KEY INVESTMENTS

Building Youth and Neighborhood Resilience **\$20.94 million** to improve the health and well-being of Trenton residents, students and employees, including \$8 million in hazard pay for eligible City workers who were active throughout the pandemic, \$1.75 million to expand mental health services, \$2 million in rehabilitation and upgrades to public parks and \$2 million toward a COVID-19 vaccine booster program.

Transforming Aging Infrastructure **\$35.12 million** to fund much-needed investments in city infrastructure, including \$4 million to replace the water main on Olden Avenue, \$4 million for updates to Trenton Public Works facilities, \$4 million for improvements to the Trenton Free Public Library, and \$4 million to replace the Trenton Police Department 911 and radio system.

Investing in Local Jobs and Businesses

\$15.63 million to improve job training and business support programs, including a \$5 million local venture capital fund, \$4 million in expanded Urban Enterprise Zone support for local businesses, and more than \$6.5 million in new internship and job training programs.

DIRECT U.S. TREASURY GUIDANCE

The guidance offers wide latitude to support public health initiatives and resources, including COVID-19 mitigation and containment, medical expenses, and behavioral and mental health services. This also includes capital investments in public facilities to meet operational requirements related to the pandemic. Municipalities are also empowered to address negative economic impacts for individuals, households, small businesses, and non-profits, especially in low-income and socially vulnerable communities.

What's New as of October 2021

The following items have been added, revised, or removed based on emergent needs and City Council and community input.

Mental Health Counseling

\$1,750,000

Provide mental health counseling to residents affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and gun violence.

Rehab & Upgrades to Public Parks

\$1,909,000

Sweeping improvements to City parks and youth recreation in all four wards. Funds will be used for repairs and improvements, including new batting cages and bleachers. *Related resolution to go before Council Oct. 5.*

COVID-19 Vaccine Booster Program

\$2,000,000

Continue vaccinating Trenton residents and support booster clinics for those who have already received the first round(s) of the vaccine.

TPD 911 System & Radio Replacement

\$4,000,000

Enhance public safety by updating 911 emergency telecommunication and radio equipment. The current system is completely outdated.

Olden Ave. Water Main Replacement

\$4,000,000

Replace 1.8 miles of 16-inch water main in Ewing Township starting Fall 2022. *Approved by City Council September 2021*.

West Trenton Community Center

\$500,000

Make structural repairs to building used by a non-profit that provides food services and youth and community programs.

Briggs Branch Library

\$200,000

Make extensive repairs and replace the roof, HVAC system, and windows and floors.

City Revenue Replacement

\$7,000,000

Replace City revenue lost due to COVID-19 in order to support continued government services at zero percent tax rate increase.

Trenton Animal Shelter

\$200,000

Provide a COVID-safe environment for additional workers by installing two office trailers.

Trenton Free Public Library

\$4,000,000

Increased from \$500,000 allocated in the original plan. Additional funding needed for HVAC replacement, a new roof, and major exterior and interior structural repairs.

Homeowner Support

\$15,000,000

Direct \$500 payment to each Trenton household has been tabled for now based on mixed public and City Council feedback.

*Trenton Water Works Billing

\$6,000,000

Make up for loss of uncollected water bills due to COVID-19.

*Make Up Lost Kiosk Revenue

\$1,000,000

Estimated loss of parking tax and meter/kiosk revenue due to COVID-19.

*Both of the above items were folded into an eligible ARP spending category - replacement of lost revenue - under federal guidelines (see 'City Revenue Replacement' above).

Trenton American Rescue Plan Proposal Version 2

The updated plan now outlining \$71.69 million in ARP spending. Items from the June 2021 spending proposal, as well as the previously-mentioned changes, are included below.

Build Youth and Neighborhood Resilience

\$20.94 million to improve the health and well-being of Trenton residents, students and employees.

Hazard Pay \$8,000,000

Essential hazard pay for eligible City workers that worked onsite during the pandemic. *Approved by City Council in June 2021.*

Mental Health Counseling

\$1,750,000

Provide mental health counseling to persons and families affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and gun violence.

Rehab & Upgrades to Public Parks

\$1,909,000

Sweeping improvements to City parks and youth recreation in all four wards. Funds will be used for repairs and improvements, including new batting cages and bleachers.

COVID-19 Vaccine Booster Program

\$2,000,000

Allocate funds to continue vaccinating Trenton residents and prepare booster clinics for those who have already received the first round(s) of the vaccine.

Youth Violence Prevention Programming

\$500,000

Recruit "take it to the streets" neighborhood counselors to intervene with at-risk youth in high crime areas of City where there is elevated potential for gang and other criminal activity.

Upgrades to Roebling Wireworks Building

\$1,500,000

Investments for indoor vaccinations and post-Covid recreational events, including replacement of broken windows, an upgraded HVAC system for year-round activities, an additional entrance for access, and an industrial kitchen for recreational classes and catering activities.

Youth Arts Programming

\$510,000

Expand recreational programming including digital music and sound engineering, musical instrument lessons, vocal coaching, dance, chess, martial arts, and creative writing.

Youth Sports Programming

\$500,000

Recreational programing for City youth with expanded team sports tournaments and clinics.

West Side Plaza

\$2,000,000

Renovate West Side Plaza Center to create a permanent vaccine site, women's health center, and children's science library.

Broadband Services

\$1,000,000

Phase 1 of a plan to offer free WiFi to every Trenton resident and business.

Fight The Blight

\$250,000

Allocation of additional resources to identify vacant and abandoned properties that need rehabilitation and upkeep. Program coordinators will work with prisoner reentry, Trenton Youth and other community engagement groups to address urban blight. Funds will target local contractors, and the program will also seek community non-profit partners to help implement the program's goals.

Book Mobile \$350,000

Mobile library unit would bring library services, including digital resources, to all four wards of the city.

Aqua Mural \$100,000

Empower student artists to create an aqua mural around the TWW Filtration Plant that will also serve as an iconic image for the Capital City.

Passage Theatre: Hedgepeth-Williams Story

\$25,000

Theatre artists will work with 8th grade students to create a show about the history of Hedgepeth-Williams Middle School, while teaching them applicable theatrical skills and techniques. The program will serve 25 students.

Photography & Videography Grants

\$50,000

Expanded grants to photographers and videographers to document City youth programs and accomplishments.

Disseminating Information

CITY OF TRENTON

\$500,000

Boost awareness of ARP programs to ensure eligible residents take advantage of the benefits.

Transform Aging Infrastructure

\$35.12 million to counter COVID-19 budget shortfalls that have prevented much-needed investments in city infrastructure.

Trenton Public Works Buildings

\$4,000,000

Increased from \$500,000 allocated in the original plan. Additional funding needed for HVAC replacement, a new roof, and major exterior and interior structural repairs.

Trenton Free Public Library

\$4,000,000

Improvements to ventilation systems and HVAC replacement, a new roof, masonry repairs to its exterior, and rehabilitation to many of its interior spaces.

911 System/Radio Replacement

\$4,000,000

Update 911 emergency telecommunication and radio equipment.

Olden Avenue Water Main Replacement

\$4,000,000

Replace 1.8 miles of 16-inch water main in Ewing Township starting Fall 2022

West Trenton Community Center

\$500,000

Make structural repairs to building used by a non-profit that provides food services and youth and community programs.

Briggs Branch Library

\$200,000

Make extensive repairs and replace the roof, HVAC system, and windows and floors.

City Revenue Replacement

\$7,000,000

Replace City revenue lost due to COVID-19, in order to support continued government services at zero percent tax rate increase.

Trenton Animal Shelter

\$200,000

Provide a COVID-safe environment for an increased number of workers by installing two office trailers, which will include plumbing and electrical work.

City Hall \$2,000,000

Update aging elevators and ventilation in City Hall.

Retrofitting Public Waste Vehicles

\$100,000

Retrofit sanitation trucks to improve ventilation, install plexiglass dividers that separate the driver from the passenger in the cab area, change air filters once a month, order disinfectant for trucks, purchase face shields for sanitation throwers, and attach durable hand sanitizer dispensers in each sanitation truck.

Trenton Municipal Courts

\$500,000

Update aging facility for spacing and distance needs to include new carpeting, and ventilation, new gallery seating, updated lighting, and new paint.

Trenton Police Station HQ

\$1,000,000

Improvements to ventilation systems and HVAC replacement.

Animal Control Services

\$4,000,000

Due to record number of citizens turning in adopted pets to Animal Control, it was necessary to expand Animal Control services. In addition, with an expanded facility, the City would partner with academic institutions to offer veterinarian tech services and basic vet care. The facility would employ returning citizens, and students would earn vet tech credits. Internships will be available to high school students interested in veterinary sciences.

Trenton Fire Department

\$500,000

Replace self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). Current gear is entering final years of acceptable NFPA Standards and must be updated.

Improve Access to Youth Dental Care

\$120,000

Trenton-based dental health care services for at-risk youth in the City.

Downtown Lighting

\$2,000,000

Update lighting in downtown business district.

Historic Site HVAC Systems

\$1,000,000

Various grants to City's historic sites that suffered loss of tourism revenue due to COVID, as well as improvements to ventilation & HVAC systems.

Investing In Local Jobs & Businesses

\$15.63 million to improve job training and business support programs.

Youth Development & Career Opportunities

\$3,120,000

Design and implement a City-wide youth engagement program to provide youth ages 14-18 with job readiness resources, structured employment, training, and career exploration opportunities.

Trenton Central High School Internships

\$1,755,000

Provide paid, local internships for high school students in areas including: STEM, Health, Trenton Water Works, Restaurant/Hospitality, & Visual Performance. This program will expand early learning and career development programs.

Adult Job Training

\$1,755,000

Like the aforementioned Youth Development and Career Opportunities, similar services will be offered to adults seeking job training.

Converting UEZ Loans to Grants

\$2,000,000

Converting UEZ loan program to forgivable grants for business losses due to COVID-19.

Loans & Grants For Small Businesses

\$2,000,000

Expand Loan/Grant program for additional small businesses to address losses due to COVID-19.

Venture Capital Fund

\$5,000,000

Create Venture Capital Fund to assess and support new entrepreneurial businesses in the City. Applicants would pitch business ideas and proposals evaluated upon best business practices. Successful business proposals would be supported and incubated in designated City areas. The Fund would partner with local business non-profits.
