
## **The Monthly Employment Report**

Employment estimates in this report are generated by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). Monthly employment estimates are subject to revision in subsequent months when more sample data become available. BLS data in this report are rounded to the nearest 100.

On a seasonally adjusted basis, preliminary estimates from the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicate nonfarm employment in Washington rose by 6,300 in October 2021. BLS estimates the private sector gained 15,600 jobs during the month and the public sector lost 9,300 jobs.

On a not seasonally adjusted basis, estimates for October 2020 through October 2021 indicate an increase in employment of 156,600 for the state. The private sector gained 138,000 jobs while the public sector gained an estimated 18,600 jobs over the year.

Washington's preliminary seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for October 2021 is 5.0 percent. The revised estimated September 2021 unemployment rate is at 5.1 percent. The October 2020 unemployment rate was 7.0 percent.

BLS estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. Preliminary estimates are subject to revision. The September 2021 preliminary estimated gain of 17,600 jobs was revised to a gain of 18,800 jobs.

#### Resident civilian labor force and unemployment, seasonally adjusted

The resident civilian labor force is the total number of people in the workforce, employed and unemployed, ages 16 and up.

The number of **unemployed** is the estimated number of people who currently do not have a job, are available for work and have actively looked for work in the last four weeks.

The unemployment rate is the ratio of the estimated number of unemployed divided by the civilian labor force.

In this case, a person holding two jobs is counted only once.


#### Unemployment, seasonally adjusted

The BLS estimates Washington's preliminary seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for October 2021 is 5.0 percent. The revised estimated September 2021 unemployment rate is 5.1 percent.

According to BLS estimates, the number of unemployed people fell by 600 in October 2021 compared to September 2021. At the same time, the number of employed people rose by an estimated 8,200. Overall, this amounted to an increase of 7,600 people in the labor force.

The preliminary October 2021 unemployment rate is 2.0 percentage points lower than the October 2020 rate of 7.0 percent.

Based on BLS estimates, Washington state nonfarm employment increased by 6,300 jobs from September 2021 to October 2021.





#### U-6 unemployment rate


# U-6: Broader unemployment measure decreased in the four-quarter period ending third quarter 2021

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) recently updated its "alternative measures of labor underutilization" for states to include annual averages for 2021. One such alternative measure is the U-6 rate, which considers not only the unemployed population in the official "U-3" unemployment rate, but also marginally

attached workers and those employed part time for economic reasons. The U-6 rate is defined by BLS as the "total unemployed, plus all marginally attached workers, plus total employed part time for economic reasons, as a percent of the civilian labor force plus all marginally attached workers." This U-6 measure measures the "unemployed, underemployed, and those who are not looking but who want a job."

The U-6 unemployment rate for the fourth quarter 2020 through the third quarter 2021 for Washington state was 11.7 percent. This was lower compared to the 13.5 percent U-6 unemployment rate for the third quarter 2020 through the second quarter 2021. The U.S. U-6 unemployment rate for the fourth quarter 2020 through the third quarter 2021 was 10.4 percent.

## One-month employment change by industry

Based on a BLS survey of businesses and governments, Washington gained an estimated 6,300 jobs during the month, on a seasonally adjusted basis:

- Overall, employment increased in seven major industries, decreased in five, and was unchanged in one in October.
- Private sector employment is estimated to have increased by 15,600 and government employment decreased by 9,300.
- Manufacturing employment rose by 6,000, with 1,600 jobs gained in computer and electronic product manufacturing
- Employment in professional and business services rose by 5,600 overall, with 2,800 jobs gained in employment services.
- Retail trade employment increased by 2,800 overall, with 1,600 jobs gained in general merchandise stores.
- Employment in leisure and hospitality increased by 1,700 over the month, led by 1,200 jobs added in accommodation and food services.
- The number of jobs in financial activities increased by 1,100 overall, with 700 jobs gained in real estate, rental and leasing.

## Change by industry over the year

Based on a BLS survey of businesses and governments, Washington gained an estimated 156,600 jobs from October 2020 through October 2021.

- Overall, twelve major industries expanded and one contracted.
- Private sector employment rose 5.1 percent, up an estimated 138,000 jobs.
- Public sector employment rose 3.4 percent, up an estimated 18,600 jobs.
- Employment in leisure and hospitality is up by 46,500, with food services and drinking places adding 32,800 jobs.
- Professional and business services employment increased by 26,700, with 15,400 jobs added in professional, scientific, and technical services.
- Education and health services employment increased by 10,900, with 7,000 jobs added in education services.
- Construction employment rose 9,000 overall, with 3,500 jobs added by specialty trade contractors.
- Employment in manufacturing is up 6,300, led by an increase of 2,400 in food manufacturing.

#### Seasonally adjusted employment

Seasonally adjusted numbers account for normal seasonal patterns that occur year after year, such as strong seasonal hiring in retail trade around the holidays. Taking into account normal seasonal variations makes it possible to see unusual changes in employment levels.

Normal seasonal change is the expected monthly change in employment based on history.

Estimated change is the employment change over the month based on BLS survey data.

Seasonally adjusted change is change in employment accounting for normal seasonal patterns.

Based on historical patterns, Washington employment typically increases by 8,900 from September to October. This year the state gained an estimated 15,200 jobs, amounting to a seasonally adjusted increase of 6,300 jobs.

 Employment in retail trade normally rises by 1,400. It is estimated to have increased by 4,200 this October so it increased by 2,800 on a seasonally adjusted basis. Normal seasonal change, estimated change and seasonally adjusted change Washington state, October 2021

- The employment increase on a seasonally adjusted basis was 5,600 in professional and business services in October. The normal seasonal decrease is 500. It is estimated to have increased this October by 5,100.
- The estimated employment decrease in construction was 1,500. The normal seasonal decrease is 700, so on a seasonally adjusted basis, construction employment decreased by 800.
- Typically, manufacturing employment decreases by 2,500 in October. On a seasonally adjusted basis, manufacturing employment increased by 6,000 as the estimated increase was 3,500.
- The normal seasonal loss in leisure and hospitality employment is 10,300 in October. The estimated loss was 8,600, so employment increased by 1,700 on a seasonally adjusted basis.

#### Benchmarking highlights

Benchmarking is a process that replaces employment estimates with the actual number of job gains or losses.

Each month, economists estimate monthly job gains and losses based on a survey of employers. Each quarter, economists benchmark the estimates by replacing them with data from employer tax records before applying seasonal adjustments.

Benchmarked employment data are now available through June 2021. Employment estimates for October 2021 presented in this report were based on the new data, plus seasonal adjustments.

Based on benchmarked June 2021 data:

- The two largest upward revisions were for government and for transportation, warehousing and utilities, up 4,200 and 3,300, respectively.
- Education and health services had the largest downward revision of -7,400.
