Train Derailment - Minnesota

Current Situation: (RV SPOTREP, as of 7:07 a.m. ET)

At approximately 3:45 a.m. ET, media reported a 22 car train derailment near Raymond, MN (pop 800). 13 cars were carrying ethanol, with at least four rail cars on fire. Fire crews and HAZMAT teams are on site. Ethanol is a flammable liquid that can produce poisonous gases such as carbon monoxide and potentially cause an explosion when stored inside a closed container.

Impacts:

- Evacuations continue within the ½-mile evacuation zone
- No injuries or fatalities have been reported
- HWY 23 closed from Kandiyohi County Rd 1 to Chippewa County Rd 1
- One shelter in place at a nearby school

MN EOC is at Normal Operations



- The FEMA NWC and Region V will continue to monitor






National Weather Forecast






Severe Weather Outlook







Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall





Fire Weather Outlook



INCIDENT SUMMARY

A Major Disaster Declaration was approved for the State of Florida on December 13, 2022, designating 10 counties for Public Assistance (Cat. A-G), six (6) counties for Individual Assistance and the statewide eligibility of the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. One (1) subsequent amendment designated Public Assistance (Cat. B) for 51 counties and two (2) tribal nations.




