
Bill Skorupa 100 Years Old








Edna Hamrell 100 Years Old

Settling in Stevensville, Mont., at the age of 12, Donna Maria faced adversity, including teasing and bullying at school, but she continued her education until eighth grade. At the age of 18 in 1935, Donna Maria snuck away from the dinner table, supposedly to visit the outhouse, and ran through a field to meet her fiance, James Gandara, in order to elope. They were married in Wallace, Idaho, and soon returned to the Bitterroot Valley where they lived the first few months in an old smoke house. Donna Maria and James raised six children while working as farm laborers during the 30s and 40s. Around 1950, they leased land from the Bitterroot Stock Farm and eventually purchased their own farm in Corvallis in the spring of 1963. They diversified their farming operations, raising grain, hay, cattle, and pigs, and running a dairy. Donna Maria's love for music is evident as she enjoys singing hymns in Spanish and Mexican folk songs. She has been very active in her life, even, remarkably, climbing St. Mary's Mountain (9,351 ft. elevation) with family members at the age of 92. Her active lifestyle continues even as she ages, with her driving and cutting grass on a riding lawnmower, even at the age of 107. 
