RECOMMENDATION TO DELAY THE OPENING OF THE

RECREATIONAL LOBSTER FISHERY OFF THE COAST OF PORTIONS

OF LOS ANGELES AND ORANGE COUNTIES

The Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA), in consultation with the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), recommends that the opening of the recreational spiny lobster fishery be delayed in state waters off the coast of mainland Los Angeles and Orange counties. The specific area recommended to remain closed includes all state waters between

- 1) the northern boundary of the Point Vicente State Marine Conservation Area, bounded along the line between:
 - 33°44.800' N latitude and 118°24.807' W longitude, and
 - 33°44.800' N latitude and 118°28.931' W longitude,

and

- 2) the westernmost point of the Long Beach Breakwater bounded along the line between:
 - 33°40.384' N latitude and 118°10.850' W longitude, and
 - 33°45.640' N latitude and 118°10.850' W longitude.

State waters extend three nautical miles out from the coastline. This recommendation is based on a finding of elevated levels of domoic acid in the viscera and roe of lobsters that were collected from this area and analyzed by CDPH laboratories. A table

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presenting the results of domoic acid sampling and analysis from the impacted areas is shown below.

Domoic acid poisoning in humans may occur within minutes to hours after consumption of affected seafood and can result in signs and symptoms ranging from vomiting and diarrhea to permanent short-term memory loss (amnesic shellfish poisoning), coma, or death.

Current federal action levels for domoic acid are \geq 20 parts per million (ppm) for all fish and shellfish, with the exception of > 30 ppm in the viscera of Dungeness crabs.

CDPH will issue a health advisory recommending that consumers not eat the viscera or roe of lobster caught from those areas adjacent to the region subject to the recreational delay of opening (CDFW fishing Block 719 and parts of Block 720). All other sections of the California coast will be open for recreational harvesting of spiny lobster. For all lobster taken from these areas, CDPH and OEHHA strongly recommend that consumers avoid eating the viscera (internal organs, also known as "butter" or "guts") and roe (reproductive parts) of lobster because they usually contain much higher levels of domoic acid than the meat.

CDFW, CDPH, and OEHHA are continuing to monitor and analyze lobster to determine when the recreational spiny lobster fishery in state waters off the coast of mainland Los Angeles and Orange counties can be opened safely.
