To MI To Whom These Presents Shall Come:

WHEREAS, Protecting our most vulnerable Kentuckians is a top priority for Attorney General Daniel Cameron; and

WHEREAS, National Missing Children's Day was established on May 25, 1983, by President Ronald Reagan, and 2023 marks the forty-year anniversary of the first Missing Children's Day in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Missing children face many dangers, particularly human trafficking, and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children estimates that one in six missing children is approached by a human trafficker in the first 48 hours: and

WHEREAS, Over 3,700 Kentucky children were reported missing in 2022 and every year many more consider running away; and

WHEREAS, Every adult can help protect a child from human trafficking, by knowing the signs that a child may be considering running away and taking steps to prevent them from going missing; and

WHEREAS, The It Saves To Know campaign, developed with grant funding from the Department of Justice, is a multipronged media campaign utilizing digital communication platforms to prevent Kentucky's kids from going missing and falling prey to human traffickers; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Daniel Cameron, Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, do hereby declare May 2023, as:

MISSING CHILD AWARENESS MONTH

in Kentucky and urge all citizens to do their part to recognize the signs of at-risk youth and prevent them from going missing.
