PERSONS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS (PEH)	<p>The Office of Emergency Management has designated LAHSA as the lead agency for work relating to people experiencing homelessness. OEM did this to ensure that LAHSA's expertise is captured in the day-to-day work and allows LAHSA to play the central coordinating role across City and County agencies. Visit our website for more information on Homelessness & Housing.</p> <p>Medical Sheltering: The County, with LAHSA's support seeks to provide 2,000 shelter beds where persons exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms can isolate safely. Medical sheltering sites will serve multiple populations, including persons experiencing homelessness. These sites include RVs provided by the state and hotels provided by the County. Physical Distancing in shelters continues to be a priority. LAHSA has requested resources that include food, personnel, test kits, and a warehouse to store acquired items. This request is currently being addressed by both the State and the County.</p> <p>Project Roomkey: Los Angeles County, LAHSA and the City of Los Angeles have collectively allocated \$39.3 million in state emergency homeless funding for Project Roomkey. Project Roomkey expands the County's interim shelter system in a massive public health effort that aims to bring as many people as possible inside to protect their health and prevent the spread of COVID-19. Hotels and motels will provide interim housing for vulnerable persons experiencing homelessness including those over 65 years of age and those with compromised immunity or chronic disease. LAHSA is currently standing up staffing and operations for Project Roomkey. The safety of clients and the staff at each hotel site is a priority. In accordance with physical distancing guidelines,</p>		

arrivals to the hotels are staggered to avoid long lines and large gatherings at the point of entry for each of the hotels. Most sites will take 2-4 days to reach capacity under this model.

(4/22/20)</p> <p>Key Findings include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The overall volume of hospital-based care for patients with COVID-19 appears stable, consistent with the continued effectiveness of physical distancing and related public health measures; • It remains unclear if current measures are adequate to lead to a reduction in illness, or if more effective measures will be required; • The number of hospital beds in Los Angeles County appears adequate to meet the projected need for the care of additional COVID-19 patients over the next 4 weeks; • The number of ICU beds in Los Angeles County, especially with the addition of new ICU beds through multiple efforts across the County, is likely adequate to meet the projected need for the care of additional COVID-19 patients over the next 4 weeks; and • The number of mechanical ventilators in Los Angeles County appears adequate to meet the projected need for the care of additional COVID-19 patients over the next 4 weeks. <p>For an update on the County healthcare system including data on available Hospital Beds, Ventilators, and Personal Protective Equipment visit the Department of Health Services COVID-19 Dashboard.</p>

The next BOS meeting will be Tuesday, April 28, 2020 at 9:30 a.m. It will be a virtual meeting with the ability to view on the web. Continue to support the JIC through collaboration with various partners to broadcast daily briefings to the public from our location. Distributing face coverings and thermometers, ensuring staff are aware of social distancing protocols, and informing staff of the Life Assistance Program. Ensuring timecards are coded for emergency response and recovery, while evaluating areas to reduce spending. 77% of staff are teleworking and 27 staff are working as DSWs. Identifying critical departmental functions and resources required for the implementation of the BOS priorities. Coordinating with the BOS to ensure that Board letters are reviewed and approved when the regular Board meeting schedules and procedures are disrupted. Received initial delivery of face covering for on-site staff. Secured 36 vehicles and 24 drivers for Project Roomkey to transport PEH to sheltering sites, with a total of 5 vehicles and drivers deployed. Continuing support of LAHSA partnership of managing 1,092 units at 14 Project Roomkey shelter sites. Completed parking lot repair in advance of crypt installation at LAC-USC. Responded to 63 COVID-19 related specialty cleaning requests and performing daily services in DPH clinics. Addressing DHS request for mobile HVAC units or fans for outdoor medical tents at Ambulatory Care Network clinics. 1,426 staff are teleworking 283 are working on-site. Developing surge planning to decompressing psychiatric emergency rooms and acute inpatient psychiatric units. Using a 'Crisis in Place' approach to address acute needs of community members experiencing distress. Implementing a video solution that will enable clinics to provide mental health counseling to patients over a secure video.
