Michigan COVID-19 testing strategy

Daily tests, by time period

5,000

Early April

Rapid scale-up with focus on vulnerable populations

15,000

Mid-May

- Testing vulnerable populations in congregate settings
- Scaling up testing in neighborhoods with low access
- Collaborating with labs and suppliers to expand capacity
- Working with FEMA to receive federal supplies

Longer-term testing for "next normal"

30,000+

June and Beyond Goal

- Continued expansion to reach vulnerable and low-access populations
- Increased testing as more people return to work
- Testing contacts of identified cases

Actions taken to rapidly scale testing

Expanded testing criteria

Rapidly expanding testing criteria to include anyone with symptoms as well as our critical workforce

Targeted collections

MI National Guard Medic strike teams:

25 teams testing corrections, veteran hospitals, and nursing homes in UP

35 teams starting similar work in rest of state

Ramping from 15,000 to 30,000+ tests per day

Testing capacity build-out

Matching laboratory capacity to specimen collection efforts to fully use all testing capacity


Working with FEMA to receive and direct supplies to increase overall testing capacity

Containment strategy

Creating opportunities for people who test positive to stay safe and well, and minimize risk to others

Informing close contacts about what they can do to further contain spread


