










Positive PCR Samples for Influenza, HETL - Maine, 2019-20










### **Antigenic Characterization (Vaccine Strain Match)**

- Federal CDC has antigenically characterized 363 influenza viruses from September 29– February 29, 2020.
  - o 86.3% of influenza A/H1N1 samples match the vaccine strain
  - o 40.8% of influenza A/H3N2 samples match the vaccine strain
  - o 65.1% of influenza B/Victoria samples match the vaccine strain
  - o 100% of influenza B/Yamagata samples match the vaccine strain
- Antigenic characterization shows if the circulating strains are the same strains that were used to make the vaccine. This does not tell you how effective the vaccine is at creating an immune response.



It does not, however, measure the extent of geographic spread of flu within a state. Therefore, outbreaks occurring in a single city could cause the state to display high activity levels.

<sup>\*</sup>Data collected in ILINet may disproportionately represent certain populations within a state, and therefore may not accurately depict the full picture of influenza activity for the whole state.

<sup>\*</sup>Data displayed in this map are based on data collected in ILINet, whereas the State and Territorial flu activity map are based on reports from state and territorial epidemiologists. The data presented in this map is preliminary and may change as more data is received.
