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down to zero, prompting him to suggest the city review its utility rates. The city has not changed its electric rate since 2009, and water and sewer rates have been unchanged since 2013, it was noted.

On the bright side, Peroo told commissioners, the city's only outstanding debt - \$1,735,393 on a Kansas Department of Health and Environment sewer loan set to mature in 2026 was a testament to the city's willingness to cut spending in order to reduce its debts and keep property taxes down.

Commissioners scheduled public hearings on the budget and their intent to exceed the revenue neutral rate with the budget for 7 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 6, the date of the commission's first regular September meeting due to the regular meeting date falling on the Labor Day holiday

Holton City Manager Kerwin McKee reminded commissioners that they had originally scheduled the hearings to open their Monday, Aug. 15 meeting, but the city was notified by the

ect. The city will pay Brunner - who has been working with the city on sewer line repairs -\$17,500 for his services.

McKee said Brunner gave him some initial information about KDOT's cost-share grant program, which prompted Mc-Kee to contact KDOT for more information. The city would have to hire an engineer to be eligible for a cost-share grant, which the city would have to provide matching funds for, according to KDOT.

Brunner had offered to prepare grant applications, put together a set of plans and specifications for repairing Banner Road and handle the bidding process for the actual work for \$17,500, McKee told commissioners. Brunner would also likely be involved in work inspections during the construction period, although no costs have yet been established for that part of the project.

Commissioners were initially skeptical about the proposal, given that at their July 18 meeting, they had turned down a proposal from Cook, Flatt and Strobel Engineers (CFS) of Topeka to oversee the Banner Road project after the company recommended completely tearing out Banner Road and starting from scratch. But after McKee reminded commissioners that the CFS proposal was merely a report and did not include any engineering specifications, the commission was more receptive to the plan to involve Brunner in making repairs on Banner Road, where road repairs using

the city's "asphalt zipper" in the past year has left several unintentional "speed bumps" on the road.

"We need to do something," commissioner Tim Morris said. "I'm hoping this is the right thing.'

Commissioners also: Approved minutes from the July 18 meeting and budget appropriations made since that meeting totaling \$286,472.97.

Met with Holton Police Chief Steve Frederick, who told commissioners that a vacancy on the police staff would be opening soon and encouraged them to participate in National Night Out activities on Tuesday, Aug. 9 on the Jackson County Courtyard.

Heard reports from McKee and commissioners about activities held as part of the Jackson County Art Walk on July 23.

Learned from McKee that no new acts of vandalism had occurred at city parks following reports heard at recent meetings of vandalism at Countryside and Rafters parks.

Adjourned the meeting at about 8:40 p.m. All five com-

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Kernodle said she's also a big proponent of public art, such as murals.

"Art used to only be in galleries or museums, and there was this barrier between social classes," she said. "Public art is for everybody to see.'

Kernodle will be adding a special sealant to the mural that will keep it from fading and is "graffiti proof."

Gov. Laura Kelly visited the mural last Friday and recently announced that Jackson County was among 14 communities selected to receive state funds for murals and public art.

The Jackson County Tourism Council was awarded \$8,400 as part of the grant. Additional murals are in various planning stages, according to Suzette McCord-Rogers of the tourism council.

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To help rural communities, Kelly created the office of rural prosperity, a division of the Kansas Department of Commerce, when she was first elected to office

"That is a one-stop shop for rural communities to find out what resources, assets and technical assistance that they might need in order to grow their small town," she said.

Kelly said the state has not entered a recession but her administration is prepared if it happens.

"Some of the measures being taken now will keep us out of a recession. So we'll see what comes," she said. "Hopefully, there won't be a recession. But if there is, I believe that Kansas is well positioned. We've spent the last three and a half years really growing the economy. We've got the unemployment rate down to

the lowest ever. We've brought in \$13.5 billion in new capital investments and close to 50,000 new jobs. We've got the largest ending balance in state history -\$1.5 billion – and another nearly \$1 billion dollars sitting in our rainy day fund. So should a recession come, and we have to tighten our belts a little bit, we have a really solid cushion. We will not see the kind of reductions in expenditures that we did to our schools and everything else during previous recessions.

Kelly said that if the country enters a recession, small businesses "get hit the hardest the fastest.'

"It's important to highlight our small businesses. I think it's also important to highlight what my administration has been doing to support our small businesses during and after the pandemic. We put in \$50 million to help them to grow back up."
