
# Michigan Syndromic Surveillance Overdose Report: March 2022




Michigan Syndromic Surveillance System (MSSS) Data in this report are taken from the Michigan Syndromic Surveillance System (MSSS)\*. This system captures chief complaints and diagnoses from emergency department (ED) visits in Michigan but does not have universal coverage across the state. Data in this report are provisional and subject to change. Certain EDs submit with enhanced feeds, which can report ICD-10-CM diagnosis codes. Diagnosis codes result in more accurate overdose identification than chief complaint mentions of overdose.





### March 2022 MSSS Overdose Rate Maps


# Rates of Drug Overdose ED Visits by Participating Hospitals in Preparedness Region\*
