

This Berkeley Ready **Household Fire Weather Planning Tool** will help residents make important decisions about how your household will stay safe during fire weather.

Print this out and complete the plan with all members of your household. Keep it ready for when fire weather is announced.

Planning Tip: Visit Zonehaven, Berkeley's evacuation management system, (https://community.zonehaven.com) to learn your evacuation zone before an evacuation is ordered. Memorize your zone, post it on your refrigerator, and write it in the box above. During a fire, you can check Zonehaven to get real-time information on your zone's evacuation status.

Planning Tip: AC Alert is Berkeley's primary emergency alerting system. Sign up for AC Alert before a fire to make sure you get messages. Officials will use it to send alerts about fire weather and evacuations. If you have a smartphone, download the Everbridge App (available for Android and iPhone) and sign into your AC Alert account.

Planning Tips:				
 The Berkeley Fire Department recommends that residents in Fire Zones 2 and 3 (the Berkeley Hills) leave during extreme fire weather, before a fire starts. A fire that starts during extreme fire weather will spread quickly and be difficult to fight. See https://cityofberkeley.info/Wildfire to learn about fire weather in Berkeley. You may choose to stay until you receive an evacuation warning or order for your zone. You should leave immediately if you experience any of the following: Fire in a home adjacent to yours, or Fire in a home close to yours and the wind is strong, or Strong winds are carrying smoke or embers through or over your neighborhood, or You feel threatened. Planning Tip: Plan now for places you can stay <u>outside the Berkeley Hills</u> during fire weather and/or fire evacuation. Your options might include friends, family, or a hotel.

If there is a fire evacuation and residents are required to stay away from their homes for a long period, the City will work with the Red Cross to designate shelters for evacuees and their pets who have nowhere else to go. These shelters will be group living situations to meet basic needs. You will sleep on a cot, sharing a large space (ex: a basketball court or community room) with many other evacuees. Your pet will be in a kennel. If you can make your own plans now, you will likely be more comfortable.



Getting Help to Pack and Leave

- Answer the following questions:
 - When you need to leave your home, what kinds of help will you need? (Navigating stairs? Lifting heavy items? Gathering your pets?)
 - o Can everyone in your household pack and leave on their own?
 - o In an emergency, normal helpers might not be available. Neighbors and people who live close by are the best option. Who is around to help you in emergencies?
- Involve your friends, family, and neighbors in planning now don't wait for an emergency to ask for help.

Planning Tip: You will have more choices the earlier you leave. If you choose to leave after a fire starts, you must always be ready to walk in case you encounter a traffic jam, get a flat tire, or the roadway is blocked.

Planning Tips:

- If you leave after a fire starts, you should plan multiple routes away from your home in multiple directions. Plan at least 2 routes for driving and another 2 for walking.
 - For walking routes, include Berkeley Path Wanderers paths. These paths
 often offer the most direct path out of the hills.
 - Highlight your evacuation routes on a map, and practice them.
- During a fire evacuation, if possible, law enforcement personnel will provide fire
 evacuees with evacuation directions. If you do not receive directions, use main
 roads to connect to major streets or freeways. Once clear of the fire area, go to
 a friend or family's home or to a hotel. If these are not options for you, drive to a
 parking lot out of the hazard area and await additional information and
 instructions.

Planning Tip:

If you are leaving before a fire starts, focus on:

- Items you need to be safe and comfortable when you arrive at your destination
- Irreplaceable or valuable items that you wouldn't want to lose in a fire.

If you are leaving during a fire evacuation, focus on:

- Items that you need to safely evacuate the fire area
- Items that you need to safely live until government/Red Cross sheltering and assistance become available
- **Remember:** You are responsible for carrying your go-bag. Make sure you can lift and carry your go-bag for your entire evacuation route.

If there is time to change:

- · Closed-toe shoes
- Cotton clothes (no polyester!) -Long sleeved shirts, pants, and a hat with a brim
- Cotton mask or dry bandana (NOT N95, KN95 or surgical mask due to possible melting)



Planning Tip: The best clothes for fire evacuation:

- a) Are made of natural fibers that will not melt, and
- b) Will protect your skin from flying embers.

Preparing our home for fire: Before we leave, we will ...

Leaving Before a Fire	Leaving After a Fire Starts
Inside your house	Evacuation Order:
 Shut all windows and doors Raise shades and remove curtains Move flammable furniture to the center of the room, away from windows and doors Turn on inside lights Turn off air conditioning 	 Close and lock doors. Evacuation Warning: Consider taking the "Leaving Before a Fire" steps.
Outside your house	
 Move any flammable outdoor items inside, or move them far away from the home (ex: patio furniture, toys, doormats, trash cans) 	
 Move propane BBQs away from structures 	
 Connect garden hose to outside water valves and spigots 	
 DO NOT leave sprinklers on or water running 	
Turn on outside lightsLeave a ladder visible for firefighters to use	
 Seal attic vents with pre-cut plywood or commercial seals 	



Planning Tip: Your first priority should be your life. After a fire starts:

- If your Zone is under **evacuation order**, leave immediately.
- If your Zone is under evacuation warning, and no one in your household needs extra time to leave, take whatever steps you can to prepare your home for fire.
