- Increasing tribal public health programs and services

- Improving public health services and strengthening epidemiologic practices and public health data infrastructure
 - enhanced multi-jurisdictional collaboration and data sharing
 - adoption of culturally and evidence-based practices
- Main activities:
 - Trainings and technical assistance
 - Collaboration and coordination of opioid response strategies
 - Providing funding to tribes and urban Indian centers to prevent and reduce opioid use and overdose.**

Saving Lives Project Year 5
Supplemental Funding



- This project is intended to provide funding to tribal and urban Indian centers to support efforts related to opioid use and overdose prevention.
 - Incorporation of at least one opioid-related data performance measure
 - Some examples:
 - Rates of opioid use or overdose
 - Number of emergency department visits
 - Number of referrals to medication-assisted treatment or other services for opioid addiction
- Eligibility:**
 - Federally-recognized tribes or urban Indian centers within the Bemidji Area (Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Chicago)
- Funding Amount:**
 - Up to \$50,000
 - Funding is non-competitive
- Project Period:** August 31, 2022 – August 30, 2023

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Grant activities must be related to opioid use and overdose prevention

Many types of activities may be conducted:

- **Conducting a needs assessment** (e.g., Community health assessment)
- **Improving data collection and surveillance systems** (e.g., Overdose Mapping and Application Program, automating data collection process)
- **Improving public health data infrastructure** (e.g., Integrating data dashboards into data collection systems)
- **Implementing upstream culturally appropriate strategies addressing risk factors for opioid misuse**
- **Enhancing public health and public safety collaborations** (e.g., Law enforcement referrals to recovery programs)
- **Enhancing linkage to care** (e.g., Peer navigator program/peer support specialist)
- **Other activities related to opioid use and overdose prevention** (e.g., Harm reduction strategies)

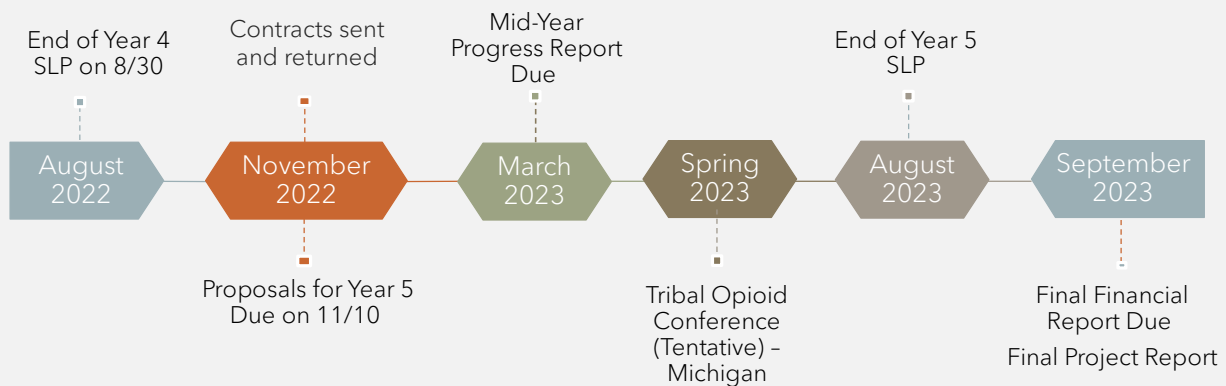
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REVIEW PROCESS
