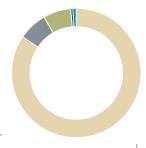

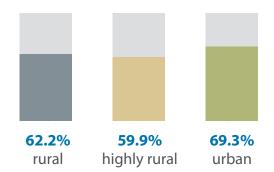

### 1) COVID-19 cases that return after antiviral treatment puzzle doctors

VA neurologist Dr. Michael Charness had a 71-year-old patient with symptoms of COVID-19. The patient started taking antiviral medication Paxlovid. By day 2, his symptoms were almost completely gone; by day 7 he was testing negative. But on day 9 the symptoms returned, and he tested positive again. "At the moment, I would say it's just a little mysterious," Charness said, "it has to be much better studied."
